## **Board Meeting Highlights - 3/19/2016**

The Tellico Village Woodworkers Club Board met on Saturday, March 19. Seventeen club members were present. The following items were discussed and, as appropriate, acted upon.

There have been 11 service projects initiated this year, 7 of which have been completed.

Secretary Wes McNeal announced his retirement as club secretary. Per Board resolution, he will continue to maintain the member spread sheet used for email communication, and to serve as backup to the new secretary as needed. The resolution also approved Rick Mannarino serving as backup to the new club treasurer.

Rick Mannarino reported \$1383.38 in the General Fund, \$160 in Toys for Tots, and \$2750.06 in the kiln amortization fund, for a total of \$4293.44

Chris Campbell reported that 88 members have paid the current year dues; 38 have not yet responded. The Board approved spending \$120 for 4 gift cards to be used by the membership secretary as door prizes at general meetings.

The Nominating Committee announced that Barry Brandt is nominated for Secretary, and Ron Cirincione for Treasurer. The entire slate of officers will be voted upon at the April general meeting. In addition, Bob Ware has been named as assistant Toys for Tots chair for next year.

Wes McNeal reported that the membership has been solicited by email to submit examples of their woodworking craft for display at the TV Community Church during May. A second request was planned.

The board discussed the feasibility of either obtaining, or making a CNC router. Ron Cirincione will form a committee to investigate options.

## **Highlights (Con't)**

Dick Hoffmann reported that our present website software will not support the new website. Karen Brown, who currently manages the website, is unable to create the new site, but has agreed to manage the new site after it has been set up. Dick will explore creating the website using Word Press, and the Board approved spending up to \$300 for this purpose.


At the next meeting, when a leader of a project asks for help, stand up and be counted, you will definitely be glad you did.



## **April Speaker**



Our speaker for the club meeting on April 7<sup>th</sup> will be Robert Puhlman of the Carolina Scroller's Club in Winston Salem, North Carolina. <u>Carolina Scroller's Home Page</u>

Bob was "smitten" by intarsia in 1988. Bob is meticulous about his woodworking and was attracted to intarsia because he thoroughly enjoys the detail needed for each project. He has entered pieces in several carving competitions including shows in Hickory, NC and has earned ribbons on all carvings entered. One of those is a crucifix combining intarsia and carving (shown below).

Bob's talk will begin with a short historical introduction to intarsia and a summary of the work of leading intarsia artists. He will present an overview of the skills, materials, tools and artistic considerations needed to complete an intarsia project from concept to completion. Specific areas discussed including: 1. Pattern selection/sources; 2. Wood selection: grain and color; 3. Pattern application; 4. Scrolling and fitting; 5. Contouring and artistic embellishment and 6. The finish.

Bob will explain the process using demo pieces. Several display pieces will be available to illustrate different aspects of intarsia and the use of other woodworking skills - carving, turning (even stained glass and clay) used to enhance a project.



## **March Meeting**

Our speaker at the March meeting provided us with a look into the history of our woodworking craft in East Tennessee. Ronald Young of Chattanooga shared some of the early history of the settlers in East Tennessee, which included many skilled furniture craftsmen. Ronnie discussed some of the furniture styles favored by these craftsmen and showed examples, some of which Ronnie has incorporated into his own work encompassing several hundred items over the years.

Rick Mannarino shows one of several snack tables he made from scrap wood, this one made primarily from oak.





## **Tools and Tips**

## Beef up Shelves

- To hide the edge of plywood shelving and add strength, use a rabbited edging.
- This joint is simpler than trying to spline a 45 degree joint.
- Round over the top edge to help hide the joint



# Measuring Circles

- Use a combination square with a framing square to bracket a circular item.
- Just read the diameter on the framing square
