# Board Meeting Highlights - 10/21/2017

The TVWC Board met on October 21 with 21 members present. The following items were discussed and, as appropriate, voted on.

Community Service: Bob Brown reported 45 projects year-to-date, with eight still open.

Treasury: Ron Cirincione reported club balances as follows: \$966 in Club Operations; \$564 in Wood Operations; \$3700 in Kiln Amortization; \$745 in Toys for Tots, for a total balance of \$5975.

Membership: Chris Campbell reported current membership at 162.

Newsletter: Tom Ringenbach proposed that he, Don Schmid, and Bob Brown would solicit our newest members by phone, from a list of new members prepared by Chris Campbell, to identify someone willing to become newsletter editor, after sufficient mentoring by the current editor.

Inventory: Currently about 800 bf in the kiln.

Toys for Tots: Bob Ware reported that team photos will begin next week. Also, the collection boxes are ready for distribution.

Ron Cirincione discussed the need for a new computer dedicated to the audio-visual needs of the club. After some discussion, a motion was made, seconded, and passed to purchase a new computer not to exceed \$600.

Lloyd Donnelly presented a paragraph describing the staffing of committees for consideration as an addition to the Resource Book. A motion was made, seconded, and passed.

Charlie Anderson announced a tool sale for next Saturday (10/28). Notice will go out to the membership. Charlie also is soliciting members for the tool sale committee.

Bob Brown proposed having a committee to install wheel chair ramps, which would have expertise in legal requirements for ramps and would be responsible for recruiting members to help build them. No action was taken.



# Tools and Tips

Whenever I glue up a frame and panel door, I want it to be dead-on square. That's why I created the jig you see in the photo. It works great for gluing up assemblies, like doors, frames or drawers, quickly and accurately. A couple of clamps across the frame will hold it together until the glue dries. Since the fixed fences are perfectly square to each other, the assembly is virtually assured to be square as well.





As you can see in the drawing, the jig has two fixed fences. But the key is the adjustable fence that forces an assembly into the fixed fences and automatically squares it. To make the jig, I cut two pieces of plywood and glued them together for a base. The next step is to cut grooves and add Ttracks. Then attach two fixed fences along two edges of the jig, making sure they're perfectly square to each other.

Finally, the adjustable fence is added. It's held in place with flange bolts and star knobs. A couple coats of paste wax completes the jig and keeps glue from sticking to the base and fences. To use the jig, I fit my assembly against the two fixed fences and slide the adjustable fence up to meet it. Then you can tighten the star knobs.
