### **Board Meeting Highlights - 7/25/2015**

The Board of the TVWW Club met July 25 at Tanasi Grill. Fourteen members were present. The following items were discussed and appropriate action taken.

With great fanfare (you had to be there), President Lloyd Donnelly presented Dick Hoffmann with a bottle of wine in appreciation for all the volunteer work Dick has done for the benefit of the club.

Vice President Don Schmid reported that the club has completed 30 community service projects year to date.

Treasurer Rick Mannarino reported a balance of \$5451.92 in the treasury, which includes \$2310.16 in the kiln amortization fund and \$35 in the TFT fund.

TFT Chairman Ken Harvey will start TFT team signups in August this year to draw

in more new members to the work teams.

The current kiln inventory consists of 600 bf of red oak, 80 bf of hickory, and 120 bf of aromatic cedar. The next wood sale is anticipated for mid-August.

Eight members have signed up for the case design workshop led by Tom Borloglou, Hugh Moore, and Ron Cirincione.

The Mentoring Survey showed three areas of interest for training: router, wood turning, and joinery. Bill McKeel, Tom Borloglou, Paul Sivak, and Dick Hoffmann volunteered to help mentor, which will start early next year. Additional mentors will be solicited.

Lloyd Donnelly and Chris Campbell will work to streamline the club's membership renewal process.

Joe Collins made this jewelry box from coco bolo wood, with a curly maple lid and blood wood handle.




Bob Brown turned this bud vase from a piece of magnolia.

Plywood Cover Up
To hide edges in plywood Cut 45 bevel off end Flip board Glue bevel to end Grain will match
