
Tools and Tips

USE MASKING TAPE TO SAVE GLUE UPS


When asked how to clean up after gluing, renowned woodworker Al Hudson asked back, "After precisely measuring and cutting expensive wood, why would one spread glue over all of the surfaces?" He said he used masking tape and I decided to follow his advice.

I recently made a craftsman style round side table from walnut and found that if I clamped the pieces together dry, that aligning the masking tape tight to the joints was relatively easy. (The chalk was used to highlight where more sanding was needed.)





Quite a bit of masking was required.



Glue that pushed out of the tight mortise and tenon joints was easy to remove.





It was worth the effort!
