The Land of Oz for Woodworkers

I suspect that more than a few of our members are website customers of Hartville Hardware. During a recent visit to northeast Ohio to reconnect with family, I made the short 15 mile pilgrimage to Hartville, Ohio to see this impressive store for myself. I encourage any member visiting the area to include it in your itinerary. Even your non-woodworking spouse will have a good time!

Billing itself as the world's largest hardware store, Hartville encompasses some 305,000 square feet under roof; that's almost seven acres!



The hardware and tool department alone covers 36,200 square feet. Nearly every major tool manufacturer is represented.

In one example of over-the-top retailing, the Festool equipment display is housed in an 1860 log cabin on the display floor (partially visible in the next photo).





An 1850 square foot "Made in the USA" house showcases products sold in the store. The exterior facades of four other houses serve a similar function.



Three drive-thru lanes serve the lumber yard and there is a separate area for exotic woods.



Prices appeared to me to be comparable to what you can find from competitors. The selection is probably better than you'll find anywhere under one roof. The fun factor of a visit to the store is, as the TV commercial keeps preaching, priceless!

Why are there three "Titebonds"? When do you use "Titebond II"? Aside from costs, is there ever an advantage of "Titebond" over "Titebond III" or "Titebond III"? Or can I simply use "Titebond III" for all my furniture projects?"

Response

Titebond II is Type II water resistant.

Titebond III is Type I, meaning it goes through more rigorous tests than a Type II glue. A quick web search showed Titebond at \$8.59/quart, Titebond II at \$10.49/quart and Titebond III at \$13.99/quart. I'd use Titebond II for outdoor furniture that will be slightly protected from the elements. Outside of expense, you could simply use Titebond III for all your woodworking projects. Or, to save some dough, keep regular Titebond on hand for standard indoor projects and Titebond III for anything that will see moisture.
