Board Meeting Highlights

The TVWC Board met on May 25, 2019. Sixteen members were in attendance. The following items were discussed and, as appropriate, acted upon.

<u>Treasurers' Report</u> Current balances are: Club Operations - \$4217; Wood Operations - \$387; Special Wood Fund - \$1002; Kiln Amortization Fund - \$4600; Toys for Tots - \$208. Total Ending Balance: \$10414. \$300 to be moved from Wood Ops to T4T for wood sale donation last month.

<u>Community Service Projects</u> Year to date, there have been 16 special service projects. Three of these are ongoing and seven projects have been completed.

<u>Membership Report</u> There are currently 177 members on the rolls.

<u>Programs</u> The June meeting will be the Spring Challenge. Each project creator will provide a brief explanation of each project by the creator before voting. All projects will be shown in the front of the room. During voting, there will be supplemental presentations from R. Cirincione, D. Breen and B. Brown.

At the July meeting, Dick Hoffman will present an explanation of the club's lumber management process. The August meeting will include a presentation from Lynn Dudenbostel on the making of mandolins. The September meeting will feature John Winter speaking on "Scenery in Wood".

Club Kiln No report this month.

<u>Wood Inventory</u> There is currently 600 bf of sycamore lumber in the kiln.

<u>Wood Sale</u> The next wood sale will be the distribution of the pre-bought sycamore that is in the kiln. A committee will send their recommendations to the Board on how to best distribute these boards.

<u>Wood Cutting</u> The majority of the logs for the next cutting will be those that we anticipate receiving from Yeager to complete the shortfall from the sycamore log. We will fill the remainder of the kiln with white oak, hickory and/or walnut logs that are at the POA yard. A date for the next cutting will be establish once the drying cycle for the current kiln load is determined.

<u>Mentoring</u> D. Schmid reported that 29 members were interested in participating in the upcoming mentoring sessions that will cover 19 different topics. Requests will be made at the next meeting and through the newsletter to find volunteers to mentor these classes.

<u>Fall Golf Outing</u> The club needs someone to organize the fall golf outing. L. Donnelly has offered to pass on information from last year's outing and assist in an advisory manner.

<u>Tool Sharpening</u> C. Anderson will contact the tool sharpener to see if he is available to sharpen saw blades for club members. We are targeting the August meeting to collect tools for sharpening.

<u>Miscellaneous</u> J. Chapman developed a "Tool Borrowing Tracking Form" which he will make available to club members through an email.

Did You Know

We're all familiar with the terms "hardwood" and "softwood" but have you ever wondered how the hardness of wood is measured? The Janka test calculates the hardness of wood by measuring the force needed to embed a steel ball halfway into a piece of wood. The hardest wood is the Australian Buloke which requires a force of 5,060 lbs to embed the ball and the softest is the Cuipo which requires only 22 lbs of force, with the familiar balsa wood being the second softest.
