Board Meeting Highlights

The TVWC Board met on September 21, 2019. Two board members were absent due to travel. Attendance was good, but no exact number available. The following items were discussed and, as appropriate, acted upon.

<u>Treasurers' Report</u> Summary of Treasurers report showed kiln amortization fund (\$4,750), Toys for Tots (\$2,053), Charity holding fund (\$200). Total ending balance (\$10,847).

<u>Membership</u> Total club membership stands at 200.

<u>Community Service Projects</u> Jim Chapman reported on completion of a wheel chair ramp for TV resident. Request for assistance for the Little Free Library program for Lenoir City and Loudon was discussed.

<u>Programs</u> Programs were reported by Tony Grenis. The October meeting will be our customary "Shop Tours" departing from the Cooper Center at 6:45. The members will be divided into three groups and travel to the workshops of Hugh Ackerman, Bruce Dillingham and Tony Grenis. The group will reconvene at Tony Grenis's shop where we will have a very short meeting and refreshments. An email will be sent to the membership with details.

The field trip to West Penn Hardwoods and Klingspor Woodworking will be on October 24 and 25. Details forthcoming via email.

November meeting is tentatively planned for a visit from an UT professor from the Fab Lab to discuss the design process they employ.

<u>*Kiln Status*</u> Poplar along with some miscellaneous boards is currently being dried.

<u>Wood Sale</u> Lloyd Donnelly stated that we will have the wood sale at 4:30 on October 8th at the Kiln. If there is inclement weather the sale will be held at the same time and location on the 10th of October. The wood for this sale is primarily poplar while there are a few cedar and cherry boards mixed in.

<u>Wood Cutting</u> The next wood cutting was scheduled for October 22 consisting of white oak, red oak and cherry.

<u>Mentoring</u> Don Schmid reported that eleven of the twelve mentoring programs have been completed with a total of 70 members participating.

General Meeting

John Winter presented the program Scenery in Wood. A former Yacht designer and builder creates works of art from scraps of wood and simple techniques.

John starts with a small sketch of his project idea and then scales to full size. He cuts out pieces of appropriate type of wood using his full-size sketch as a pattern. After gluing the pieces together, he fills in the seams using two-part marine epoxy and sands the surface smooth. He builds a support frame and attaches to the back with epoxy and screws. He finally seals the work with 2 coats of semi-glass varnish. It takes about 30 hours to complete his scene.
