Board Meeting Highlights

The TVWC Board met on September 26, 2020 at Little Italy. Seventeen members including the board were in attendance. The following items were discussed and, as appropriate, acted upon. <u>Treasurers' Report</u> The budget currently has \$3933.55 in the Club Operations Fund, \$79.95 in the Wood Operations Fund, \$8739.89 in the Reserve Fund, \$898.75 in the TFT Fund, \$275.00 in the Charity Fund for an Ending Balance of \$13927.14. Ron Cirincione noted that there was \$898.75 in the TFT Fund and suggested that we add additional funds to this amount so a \$1000 donation could be made to the cause. This additional money could be taken from the budgeted money for the TFT presentation at the Community Church which will not occur this year. Board members were in agreement with this proposal.

<u>Membership</u> The club currently has 217 members.

<u>Secretary's' Report</u> Email distributions have gone much smoother this past month after dividing up our distribution list into three smaller lists.

<u>Community Service Projects</u> The Tee markers for the golf courses are almost done. A team has been formed to make cabinets for the County Court House. A new project was requested to make another box for the club's name tags.

<u>Programs</u> The programs committee met recently and laid out an agenda for the upcoming year. The scheduled program at our next meeting will be a presentation on "Wood Inlay" created by Dick Hoffmann. The following month will feature P. Sivak who will discuss furniture renovation. Several ideas for future field trips were discussed. Next year's Spring Challenge will be for members to make a project using a new skill or technique that they have never done.

<u>Newsletter</u> The newsletters continue to be excellent and Carl Hagen welcomes all article contributions from members concerning completed projects or recommended shop tips. <u>*Kiln Status*</u> The kiln's drying cycle is progressing smoothly with the moisture content down to 20%. B. Barbre anticipates to drying cycle to be completed by 12/2/20. The breakdown of lumber includes 65 bf of beech, 380 bf white oak, 200 bf walnut, 250 cherry and 260 bf hackberry.

B. Nance has a pallet of stickers that he is willing to donate to the kiln to replace the existing worn out stickers.

Concern was expressed about the lack of kiln storage for excess milled and wheelchair ramp lumber. B. Brown volunteered to check with the POA personnel to see if an area near the milling pad was available to build a storage shed at this time.

<u>Wood Sale</u> The next wood sale has been scheduled for Tuesday 12/8/20 at 1 pm with a backup date of 12/10/20. L. Donnelly describe a new marking procedure that will use chalk to identify the different species at the milling operation and to post the board feet on the boards at the kiln. Labels will only be used on donor boards. J. Chapman will be taking over the duties of the Wood Sales Manager and B. Buelow will be his assistant.

A gentleman from Greenback is willing to donate a barn full of lumber to the club. There are various species of unidentified wood which appears to be mostly sycamore. The boards are air dried and mostly 18" x 9'. This gentleman asked that the lumber would be primarily used to help the community in some way. An initial suggestion was made to use this wood to assist in the "Our Place" project. A committee of L. Donnelly, B. Barbre, B. Fagerlin, R. Pierce and B. Brown was formed to determine how best to utilize this donation of approximately 2500 bf of lumber.

<u>Wood Cutting</u> The next cutting is scheduled for December 15 which will be primarily poplar. This cutting will be followed by a hardwood cutting in February that will be comprised of walnut and hickory.

<u>Toys 4 Tots</u> The toys and club's TFT donation will be taken to sheriff's office next Tuesday. Steve Bolton and Andy Markel have volunteered to head up the TFT committee for next year and will be looking for new members to join the committee. Early in January, they will meet to discuss the overall program and to define our direction in the future. This may be the time to work with other charitable organizations like Fantasy of Trees to diverse our efforts.

<u>Tool Sales</u> Tom Ringenbach, our tool sales manager, has a problem in sending out pictures of tools being sold to our club members. C. Hagen will work with D. Hoffmann to set up a link that would allow these pictures to be sent to club members.

<u>Vendor Appreciation</u> C. Hagen shared with the Board an appreciation letter that he wrote that will be sent to our vendors who have supported our organization throughout the year. It was noted that we can augment this appreciation by verbally communicating these vendor's support to our friends and neighbors <u>Club Hats</u> In an effort to find a new source for club hats, Barry Brandt showed a sample hat that is being recommended to purchase. A motion was made and approved to buy 36 hats which will have the club's logo embroidered on the front.

There is a need for additional members to join the tool sale committee and also a need for a committed member to assist the kiln manager when he is not available.

Did You Know?

The March of the Wooden Soldiers from the 1934 film <u>Babes in Toyland</u> starring Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy was filmed using 100 6-foot tall wooden figures using stop action amination. The wooden solders were constructed of carved wood and machined metal parts that were meticulously hand painted, with additional bent wire bayonet detail. The figure had fully articulating arms and legs with hinged "ankles" and a split base allowing the figure to "walk". Some of the figures are still in existence.
