16 attended November 26th Board meeting - Everyone is welcome to attend Kiln status: Larry Gardner reported on the kiln status and wood cutting. Discussion of donor/special cuts/club allocation resolved any ambiguity for the next sale. Kiln stock will be marked into four relatively equal allocations.

EPOXY FOR ACCENTS - Tony Grenis

Below are some highlights from his Excellent presentation.

EPOXY RESINS

Cure when the hardener is mixed with the resin.

TYPES OF EPOXY RESIN

Table Top resin for depths of ¼" or less. Deep pour for depths ¼" to 4" Quick set resin can cure in 15 minutes or so.

TABLE TOP EPOXY RESINS

Generally mixed 50:50 (resin to hardener), cure in about 24 hours but will continue to harden for up to 30 days.

Generally self leveling and produce a glossy surface.harder than the deep pour or casting resins.

Can be colored with pigments or dyes. Generally safe for food contact surfaces (but check)





PREPPING THE WOOD

Remove bark or soft punky wood, leaving only firm solid wood.

FORMS

Buy premade silicon forms or cheaper to make your own.

EPOXY FOR ACCENTS - Tony Grenis

POURING EPOXY

Eliminate voids dust and dirt, secure/fasten wood to not float, be prepared to deal with leaks and allow time to harden before removing from form.

BUBBLES

Try to prevent bubbles and if needed pop them with a flame or hot air.

FLOOD COATS

Table top epoxy produces a perfectly level and shiny surface, 3 fl oz per square foot.

Pour in the center and trowel to edges and cover the sides.

Remove Drips on bottom edge

Pop bubbles on top, but don't use the torch or heat gun on the sides.

FLOOD COATS

Cured epoxy can be worked with sharp woodworking tools slow and shallow.

Tony sands the wood and epoxy up to 400 grit and finishes with Osmo or Oddies hard wax/oil finish.

Or you can continue with wet sanding up to 5000 or 10,000 followed by a polishing compound.
